ANNUAL EVENTS

SEP 25 - GLEN ANAQUOD ANNUAL MEMORIAL TIPI RAISING COMPETITION

Each September, the ta-tawâw Student Centre hosts the Glen Anaquod Annual Memorial Tipi Raising Competition, inviting university and high school students to engage in a fun, hands-on learning experience about Indigenous culture and values.

OCT 3 - MÉTIS FIDDLE DANCE

Get ready for a lively community event led by a Métis band leader and community members. Please join us and learn about traditional Métis dance songs and styles. All proceeds support SUNTEP (Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program) student events.

FEB 6 - NEEKANEEWAK LEADERSHIP ROUND DANCE

The Neekaneewak Leadership Round Dance at the University of Regina is an annual event that celebrates Indigenous culture through music, dance, and community, providing students and faculty an opportunity to honor traditions and for NLI students to demonstrate leadership.

APR 2 - INTRODUCTION TO POW WOW

Intro to Pow Wow features live dance performances and explores the cultural, spiritual, and historical aspects of powwow, including its development, dances, and regalia, welcoming all who want to learn more.

NEEKANEEWAK LEADERSHIP INITIATIVE (NLI)

The NLI is a program where students are provided opportunities to enhance and develop the diversity of their leadership skills. Students participate in volunteer activities and any of the numerous events hosted in the Centre. Social gatherings are hosted throughout the academic year as a great way to network and connect with the campus and larger community. The ta-tawâw Student Centre hosts the Neekaneewak Leadership Initiative awards every year. The awards celebrate Indigenous students who support the community through their involvement and engagement in the Centre's programming.

The NLI focuses on four distinct areas of leadership development:

- Academic Leadership
- Professional Leadership
- Cultural Leadership
- Community Leadership

CULTURAL CREATIVITY

Take a break from studies and explore your creative side at the ta-tawâw Centre! The Centre offers art-making workshops for all skill levels, including ribbon skirt and shirt design, moccasin-making, and beadwork.



FIRST NATIONS UNIVERSITY OF CANADA

First Nations University of Canada (FNUniv) is the only First Nations-owned post-secondary institution in Canada, designed to ensure student success while embracing Indigenous values, history, and culture. With campuses in Regina, Saskatoon, and Prince Albert, FNUniv provides comprehensive student services to support academic and personal growth. The Regina campus is located on the atim kâ-mihkosit (Red Dog) Urban Reserve, Star Blanket Cree Nation, and Treaty 4 Territory, with Star Blanket being the first First Nation in Canada to create an urban reserve dedicated to education.

- **Academically**, FNUniv offers tutoring in subjects like math, science, and Indigenous languages, along with writing clinics to help students refine their skills.
- **Community-wise**, FNUniv hosts a variety of events throughout the year in partnership with the student association, including orientation, welcome week, holiday celebrations, and winter solstice activities, ensuring students feel connected and engaged.
- **Personally**, students have access to Elder services and ceremonies, supporting mental and emotional well-being while strengthening cultural values. Additional counseling services are also available through the University of Regina.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A FEDERATED COLLEGE STUDENT?



A federated college offers students a close-knit community within a larger university. First Nations University of Canada (FNUniv), one of the three federated colleges at the University of Regina, provides Indigenous students with a culturally supportive environment while they pursue their U of R degree. As U of R students, FNUniv students have access to all university services, classes, scholarships, and supports, alongside unique opportunities and a strong community.

CAMPUS LIFE & SUPPORTS

INDIGENOUS CAREER EDUCATION

Indigenous Career Education supports academic and career success with co-ops, internships, job postings, and workshops. Services include resume reviews, mock interviews, and an employer luncheon series to help you prepare for your career.

LIVING ON CAMPUS

Living on campus means being part of a supportive community with fun events and great perks! Choose from furnished rooms or 7-bedroom apartments, all with free wi-fi, utilities, 24/7 support, and cozy lounges. Plus, Indigenous students can apply for a \$1,500 housing award each year!

KNOWLEDGE KEEPERS

Sit with, learn from, and be guided by on-campus Elders. Students also have access to a cultural advisory room to smudge and seek one-on-one counsel.

* If you plan to apply for band funding, please check with your post-secondary coordinator to find out if your application fee will also be covered. If so, you can request a deferral of the application fee by contacting the Registrar's Office at admissions@uregina.ca.

ADMISSION TYPES

We welcome students to start their studies either in the Fall, Winter, or Spring/Summer terms. The admission criteria for students is dependent upon your most recent educational experience. Here are the options:

- **High School Final:** Applicant has successfully completed their high school and has not attempted more than 12 credit hours from a recognized post-secondary institution.
- **Mature Admit:** Applicants may have either not completed their high school diploma or may not have the credits or average required to enter their program of choice. Applicants must be over the age of 21 and have not attempted more than 12 credit hours from a recognized post-secondary institution.
- **Adult 12:** Applicant completing their high school diploma through an Adult Basic Education 12 program.
- **Upgrading:** Applicant is upgrading their high school courses to be admitted to their program of choice.
- **Post-Secondary Transfer:** Applicant has attempted 15 or more credit hours from a recognized post-secondary institution.

STEPS TO APPLY FOR BAND FUNDING

1. OBTAIN YOUR U OF R ACCEPTANCE LETTER.
2. TALK TO YOUR POST-SECONDARY COORDINATOR.
3. COMPLETE THE FUNDING APPLICATION BEFORE THE DEADLINE.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Paying for school can be tough, but there's good news—there are many financial supports available just for Indigenous students. In this section, you'll find helpful info on scholarships, bursaries, and other funding options to make your education more affordable.

SCHOLARSHIPS & BURSARIES

The University of Regina awards almost 4,000 scholarships and bursaries each year. There are a number of awards specifically for Indigenous students, including:

- Compugen Young Indigenous Women in Saskatchewan Technology Award
- Honouring Our Future Entrance Bursary
- Shell Canada Engineering Indigenous Entrance Award
- University of Regina Indigenous Entrance Award

MÉTIS STUDENTS

There are specific funding sources available for Métis students. For example, the Gabriel Dumont Institute provides scholarships to Métis students who are Saskatchewan residents and registered as full-time students. Students can contact the Gabriel Dumont Institute at usponsorship@gdins.org.

BAND FUNDING

Status Indian or Inuit students may be eligible for post-secondary funding through the Post-Secondary Student Support Program. The program offers funding support to students in the following areas:

- Community college, diploma, or certificate programs
- Undergraduate programs
- Advanced or professional degree programs
