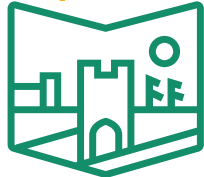

Did you know?

A **bachelor's or undergraduate degree** is the first university degree you can pursue after finishing high school. These programs usually take three to five years to complete. While many students enter the workforce right after completing their bachelor's degree, others continue their studies in professional or **graduate programs** (e.g., master's or doctorate degrees).

Your **major** is your primary area of study in your bachelor's degree; for example, you could enroll in a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in English, history, communications and media, or

psychology. You can also add a **minor**, or a secondary area of study, to your bachelor's degree; for example, you could enroll in a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in English and a minor in psychology. Minors are entirely optional.

Professional programs are programs that require one or more years of university study for admission. These include counselling, dentistry, education, law, medicine, nursing, social work, and more. Many students complete their prerequisites for professional programs at CMU.

Pre-professional studies

Start here. Go anywhere.

At CMU, you can begin the journey toward a professional career—like medicine, law, nursing, or veterinary medicine—by completing the prerequisites these programs require. These are called pre-professional studies.

Start at CMU to build a strong interdisciplinary foundation. Then carry that strength with you as you apply to the professional program of your choice.

For example, if you want to be a doctor, medical schools require a set of science and humanities courses before you can even apply. You can take those courses at CMU—in small classes, where professors know you, challenge you, and help you thrive. Then, you'll be ready to apply to medical school, fully and confidently prepared.

The majestic Assiniboine Castle is home to classrooms, staff and faculty offices, common spaces, an Indigenous lounge, the Blaurock Café, the Laudamus Auditorium, Spytower Press, and the Loewen Athletic Centre.

Marpeck Commons welcomes the public to folio café, a third-wave coffee shop, a campus bookstore and resource centre, and a stunning library—with student dedicated space on the mezzanine, including classrooms, study rooms, and common spaces.

South Hall is a hub of academic and student life at CMU—housing more classrooms, staff and faculty offices, the chapel, the student centre, academic advising, and support services.

The residence community at CMU spans three buildings—Poettcker Hall, Concord Hall, and the Katherine Friesen Apartments—fostering deep friendships, shared meals, and a strong sense of belonging that shapes the student experience.

Sanctoral Cycle, the student-run bike co-op, includes a shop to fix and build bikes plus a bike share program.

The Mennonite Heritage Archives and MHC Gallery also find their home on the CMU campus, grounding the community in its historical context while inspiring engagement through cultural reflection, art, and creative expression.

In residence, you'll live and learn alongside students from diverse backgrounds who are taking different classes than you. Through residence events, evening snack, student groups, and spontaneous gatherings, you'll have countless opportunities to connect and build lifelong friendships.

Convenient and affordable

Living on campus means you have easy access to the full range of academic and personal supports CMU provides. You can easily study, workout, hang out with friends, or even take a nap—all between classes. The convenience of residence life makes it easy to participate in the full university experience while saving time and money.

Transition to independent living

For many students, university happens alongside their transition into adulthood. When you live on campus, we take care of details like utilities and meal prep so you can focus on developing other important life skills such as time management, budgeting, and building lasting friendships. Your Residence Assistant lives just down the hall and is available to help you navigate university life.



On-campus housing

The best learning happens in community. So, CMU has intentionally designed a residence program that helps you thrive. Living on campus saves you time and money so you can focus on academics, connect with friends, participate in activities and events, and live out what you're learning in the classroom.

Housing options

CMU has three residence buildings: Poettcker Hall, Concord Hall, and the Katherine Friesen Apartments. First- and second-year students typically live in dorm rooms. Apartment units are available to students in their third year and beyond.

Student life

Academic advising and supports

At CMU, your success comes first. As a first-year student, you'll join an advising group that helps you navigate the complexities and challenges of university life. Peer Academic Tutoring and Help is there to give you extra support. Academic Advisors guide your course choices, keeping you on track for graduation and whatever comes next, whether that's a career, a professional program, or graduate studies.

Student leadership

You'll find countless ways to grow as a leader at CMU. Serve on Student Council or a student association, plan events, or lead a student group. Take on a Residence Assistant role to build a positive living-learning environment or become a Student Navigator and help new students find their footing in university life.

Spiritual life

At CMU, your faith journey matters. You're invited, not required, to grow in Christ through weekly chapels and forums, student-led Wednesday Night Worship, and small groups. You can also explore your own practices in a dedicated on-campus prayer room, open to students of all faith backgrounds.

Counselling and wellness

Your well-being—physical, mental, spiritual, and emotional—is a priority at CMU and is essential to your academic growth. You'll find workout spaces, recreation programming, and free short-term counselling services, all designed to support your well-being and academic success. Make the most of your Student Drug and Dental Plan, and enjoy abundant green space on campus, with the Assiniboine Park and Assiniboine Forest right next door.

Living off campus

Play on an athletics team, cheer from the stands, or jump into campus recreation. Share meals at community potlucks, challenge friends at chess club, or join many other activities that bring people together. Relax with friends in Marpeck Commons or the student-run Blaurock Café, or unwind in one of the commuter lounges where you'll always feel at home.

Accessibility services

If you have a documented disability, you can access academic accommodations to support your learning. Reach out to your Admissions Counsellor to get started.

International students

At CMU, 12% of students come from around the world. International students receive support through orientation, social events, and workshops on immigration, employment, health insurance, and more. A Registered International Student Immigration Advisor offers guidance on study permits, work placements, and post-graduate work permits.



Indigenous engagement and reconciliation

16% of CMU's Manitoba students identify as First Nations, Inuit, or Métis.

CMU is located on Treaty 1 territory and is committed to building and sustaining meaningful relationships with Indigenous students, communities, and ways of knowing—and with all of creation.

The CMU Indigenous Council offers wisdom, guidance, and insight to the university—both institutionally and in specific academic areas such as program design and curriculum development. The Indigenous Council maintains a direct relationship with the CMU Board of Governors, helping shape the university's commitments to reconciliation, learning, and right relationships.

CMU is a charter partner of the Manitoba Collaborative Indigenous Education Blueprint and reports annually on its commitments to



Indigenous education and the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action.

All Indigenous courses are developed in active collaboration with Elders, Knowledge Keepers, and Indigenous leaders through the CMU Indigenous Council.

The CMU Blazers wear Treaty 1-themed uniforms, designed by Indigenous artists and in consultation with Indigenous community leaders.

Our partnership with Sandy-Saulteaux Spiritual Centre fosters cross-cultural learning and friendship through a covenanted relationship renewed in annual bundle exchange ceremonies.

Since 2022, the CMU learning community gathers annually to set up the student-initiated Cree tipi, which is used for ceremony, class, and community gatherings, and to reflect on the tipi teachings we've been given.

An on-campus Elder in Residence offers students and staff wisdom, care, and spiritual guidance.

CMU funds Indigenous student awards directly through our financial aid program, and through the Indspire: Building Brighter Futures program.

Tuition and fees

The total cost of tuition and fees is based on the number of courses you take. While a full course load is five classes per semester, many students choose to take four classes per semester to make time for other activities and commitments.

How much does it cost to live on campus?

CMU has the most affordable on-campus housing costs of any university in Manitoba! In fact, CMU is offering free double-occupancy dormitory housing in Poettcker Hall to new undergraduate students.

This offer is available to domestic and international students who are 21 years old or younger, are in their first two semesters of study at CMU, are enrolled in at least 12 credit hours per semester, and are participating in a full board meal plan.

Scholarships, awards, and bursaries



CMU provides scholarships, awards, and bursaries to approximately 50% of the student body each year. Scholarships and awards range from \$1,000 to \$5,000 per year and are offered based on academics, essay submissions, resumes, and/or references. Bursaries range from \$500 to \$6,000 per year and are offered based on financial need. Visit cmu.ca/financialaid for details, eligibility, and additional financial aid opportunities.

Automatic scholarships

Academic Entrance Scholarships

CMU provides scholarships to high school students with high academic entrance averages.

- 85% to 89.9% - \$1,000
- 90% to 94.9% - \$2,000
- 95% and up - \$3,000

To receive this scholarship, apply for admission and provide a current transcript by February 28.

Transfer Entrance Scholarships

Transfer students are eligible for scholarships of \$1,000 if they have a GPA of 3.5 or higher on a 4.5 scale or a GPA of 3.3 or higher on a 4.0 scale.

To receive this scholarship, apply for admission and provide all required transcripts by May 31.

Application-based scholarships and awards

Leadership Scholarships and Leadership Merit Awards

CMU offers Leadership Scholarships of \$20,000 over four years and Leadership Merit Awards of \$2,000 over one year.

Academic Merit Awards

Academic Merit Awards of \$6,000 over three years are offered to new students who reflect a clear understanding of CMU's vision.

Application deadline: February 28

Business, Music, Science, and Social Work Merit Awards

Program Merit Awards of \$6,000 over three years are offered to new students accepted to business,

music, science, and social work programs at CMU.

Application deadline: February 28 (business, music, and science) or April 30 (social work)

John and Charlotte Friesen Scholarships

John and Charlotte Friesen Scholarships of \$1,000 to \$3,000 are offered to first-generation university students.

Application deadline: April 30

Merna and Leonard Neufeldt Scholarships and William Janzen Social Work Scholarships

Merna and Leonard Neufeldt Scholarships of \$1,500 and William Janzen Social Work Scholarships of \$1,000 are offered to new and returning social work students.

Students who travel from outside of Winnipeg to visit campus are eligible to receive a travel subsidy of up to \$400 if they choose to attend CMU.

Faith Community Matching Grant

CMU matches funds sent by a student's faith community in support of their studies, up to \$500 per year.

Government student aid

CMU students are eligible to apply for provincial and federal grants, bursaries, and loans through the student aid body of their home province.

Transfer students
Transfer students with fewer than 30 completed credit hours of post-secondary education will be assessed for admission based on their high school transcripts, while those with more than 30 completed credit hours will be evaluated based on their post-secondary transcripts.

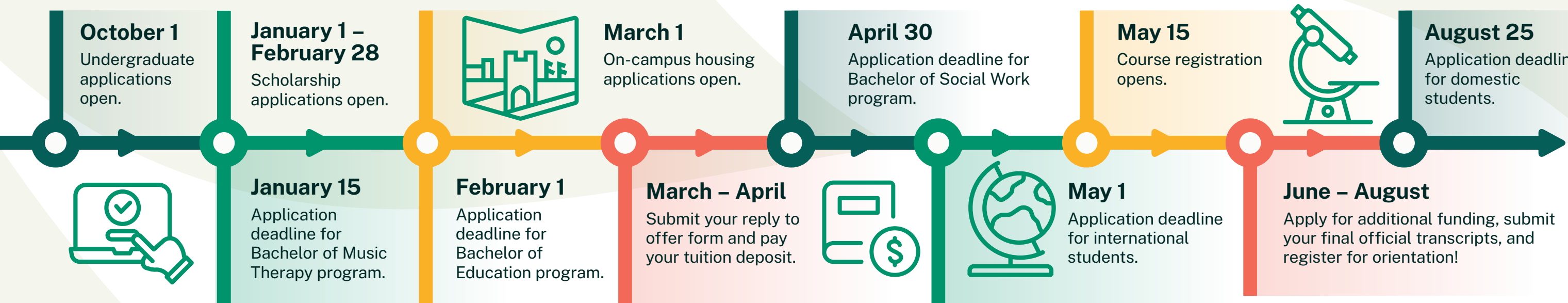

Your application will not be processed until your application fee—\$90 for domestic students, \$150 for international students—is received. Domestic students who visit campus will have their application fee waived.

Applicants must submit transcripts from high school and all post-secondary institutions attended to be assessed for admission. If courses are in progress, interim transcripts can be provided until final official transcripts become available.

January 1 – February 28

Applications for CMU scholarships and awards are open in January and February. To be considered, submit your scholarships and awards application and any supporting documentation before February 28. Check out all our financial aid opportunities at cmu.ca/financialaid.

January 15

The Fall 2027 application deadline for the **Bachelor of Music Therapy** program is January 15.

February 1

March 1

March – April

April 30

May 1

May 15

Course registration for new students opens on May 15. New students are strongly encouraged to book an appointment with an Academic Advisor to register for courses.

June – August

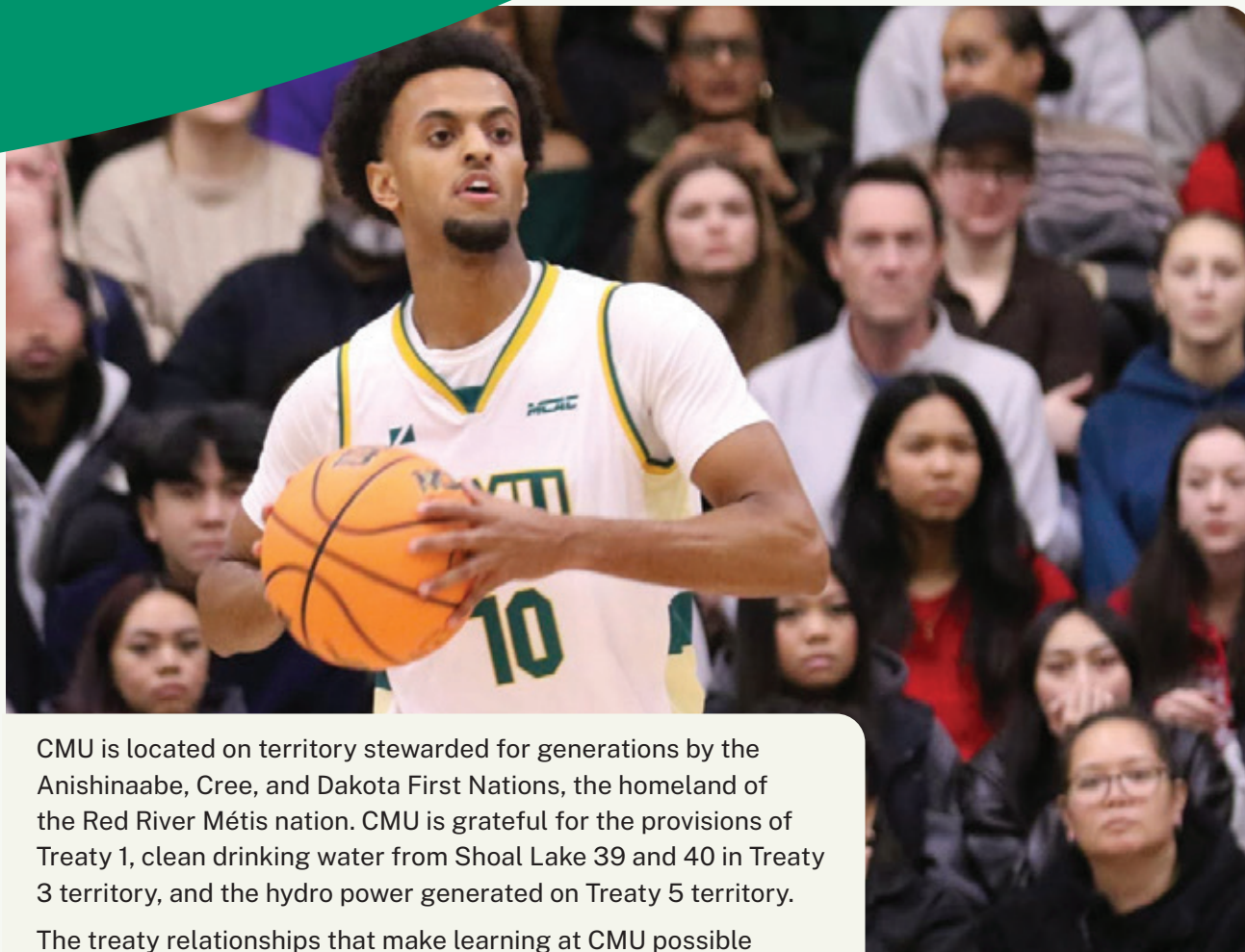
