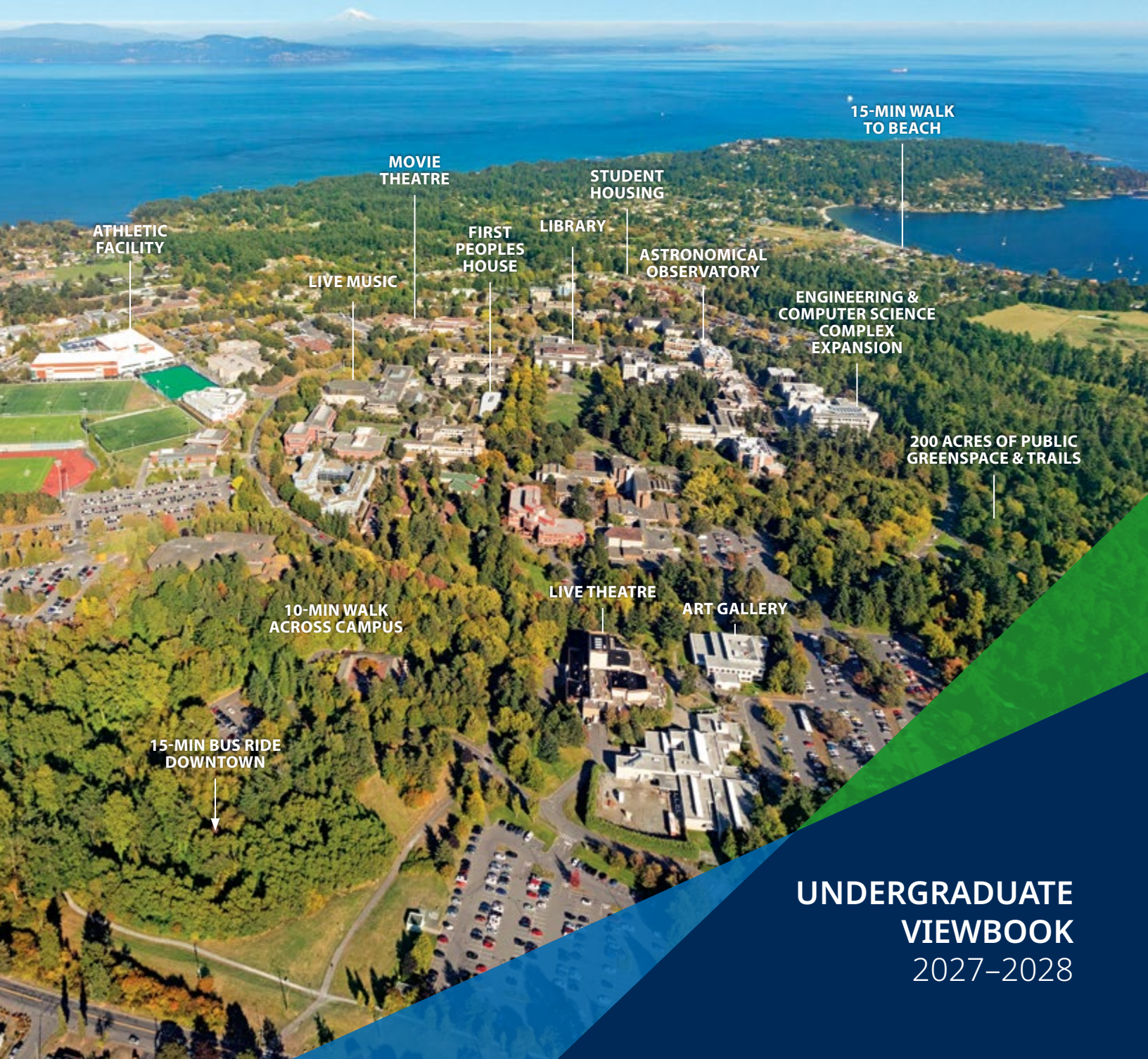

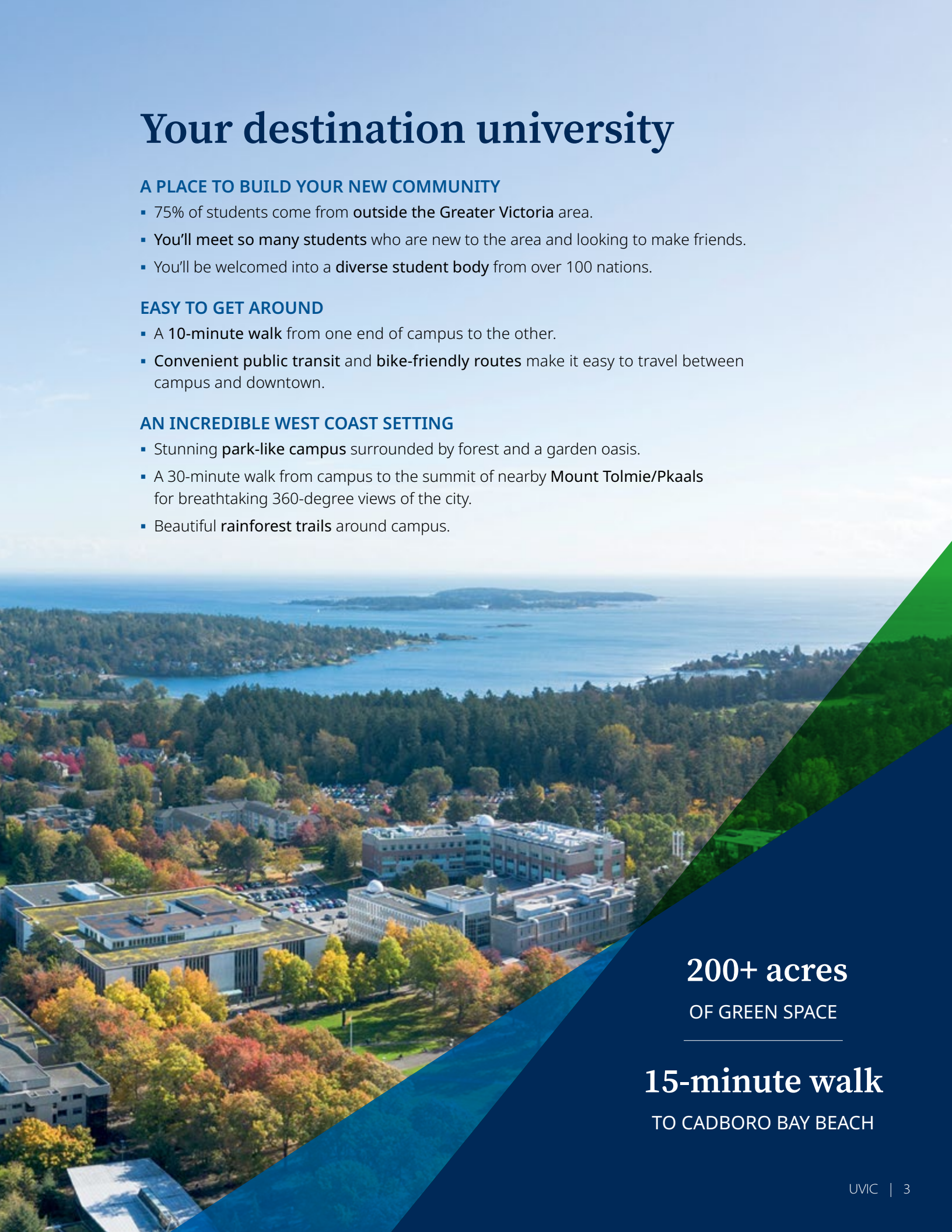

Guaranteed housing for first-year students

ARE YOU ELIGIBLE FOR THE FIRST-YEAR RESIDENCE GUARANTEE?

You are guaranteed a place in residence if you

- graduate high school in 2027
- are coming straight from high school
- apply for admission by **January 31**
- apply for residence by **February 15**

If you are not eligible, please see uvic.ca/residence for details on other on-campus residence options, including the undergraduate residence lottery.

WHEN SHOULD YOU APPLY FOR RESIDENCE?

The residence application opens on **October 5** for students starting at UVic in September 2027. You can apply for residence before you've received your admission decision.

If you're a current high school student, the deadline to apply for residence is **February 15**.

If you're not a current high school student, the deadline to apply for the undergraduate residence lottery is **May 15**.

YOUR MEAL PLAN

When you move into a dorm room, you automatically receive a residence meal plan. This meal plan is added to your student card (ONECard) and has an allotment of money that you can use to easily tap-and-pay for food and beverages in University Food Services dining outlets. uvic.ca/food

Scholarships

AUTOMATIC ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS BASED ON YOUR ADMISSION AVERAGE

We will automatically consider you for these scholarships. You do not have to apply to be eligible. Scholarship figures shown here are from the **2026–2027** academic year. Scholarship values change each year. For the most up-to-date scholarship values and scholarship-application deadlines, visit uvic.ca/scholarships.

WHO ARE YOU?	WHAT ARE YOU ELIGIBLE FOR?
Canadian citizen or permanent resident*	\$3,000 – \$6,000. You will need a minimum GPA of 90% to be considered.
International student*	\$15,000. You will need a minimum average of A- or equivalent to be considered. If you have a minimum of 32 IB points, you are eligible for the \$10,000 International IB Entrance Scholarship; with 36 or more IB points, you are also eligible for the \$15,000 International Entrance Scholarship. For example, a student with 38 IB points would receive both. IB scores are calculated excluding bonus points.
A transfer student coming directly from another Canadian post-secondary institution	If you are coming directly from another Canadian post-secondary institution with a minimum of 12 transferable graded units and your admission average is 7.5 out of 9 points (UVic scale), you are eligible for \$3,000.
Indigenous student*	\$3,000. You will need to provide an Indigenous Citizenship Declaration (ICD) application if you would like to be considered for Indigenous-specific scholarships. *Eligible students must be current secondary students or entering UVic within two years of having completed secondary school with no post-secondary coursework completed after high school graduation.

BONUS! APPLICATION-BASED ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS

These are scholarships that you apply for and are evaluated based on specific criteria. Criteria may include your admission average, volunteer and leadership experience. Apply at uvic.ca/entrancescholarships.

What program do you want to study?

NOT SURE WHAT TO STUDY? THAT'S OKAY!

Many students use their first year to explore different subjects before choosing a major. If you're not sure what you want to study, apply to Humanities undecided, Science undecided or Social Sciences undecided. This means you can explore disciplines and choose your major when you're ready—usually at the end of your first year.

CUSTOMIZE YOUR DEGREE WITH AREAS OF FOCUS

Many UVic programs offer specialized areas of focus that let you tailor your studies to your interests. For example, in Biology, you can specialize in Marine Biology, Neurobiology or Forest Biology. Programs that offer areas of focus are marked with a plus symbol (+). Explore all your options at uvic.ca/programs.

SECOND-CHOICE PROGRAMS

The application will prompt you to select an optional second-choice program. You will only see second-choice programs that have lower admission requirements than your first-choice program. If you aren't admitted into your first-choice program, don't worry. There is a chance you can declare your first-choice program after your first year. Contact your student recruiter for more details. uvic.ca/undergraduate

- Completion of Grade 12 English or its equivalent in Canada with a final grade of 86% or higher within the last three years prior to admission.
- IB: Higher Level English A with a score of 4 or higher.
- AP: Advanced Placement English Language and Composition/Literature Exam with a score of 4 or higher.
- British Curriculum (A-level):

Applying to UVic is easy

Once you've set up your EducationPlannerBC profile, your UVic application should take about 10 minutes to complete and submit. If your program requires supplemental information such as a portfolio, essay or an audition, it will take longer. **You do not need to submit your grades when you submit your application. Submitting your grades is a separate step you will do later.**

1. REVIEW ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

2. SUBMIT YOUR APPLICATION

1. Start your application in EducationPlannerBC as early as possible. You can save it and submit it by the deadline. uvic.ca/apply

3. Prepare your supplemental application (if required) and submit it by your program's supplemental application deadline. Some programs require you to upload your supplemental information at the time of application. uvic.ca/programs

5. Receive a confirmation email with your UVic student number and next steps on how to submit required documents.

2. Receive an introductory email from your UVic admission assistant with instructions on how to access the UVic application portal. Use your NetLink ID to log in to the application portal to submit your grades and other required documents. You should receive these emails within two weeks of applying.

4. SUBMIT YOUR INTERIM GRADES AND OTHER REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- If you're a student in the BC curriculum, you must order your transcript through StudentTranscripts Service at the Ministry of Education website as soon as you apply. Choose the default option that allows updates for one year.
- If you're studying at a high school in Canada other than in BC, or at a Canadian-curriculum high school outside of Canada, we encourage you to upload your interim transcripts or predicted IB scores via the link on your checklist in the UVic application portal. If you do not receive an admission offer by February 15, you must self-report your interim grades via the link on your checklist in the UVic application portal.
