Conditional admissions process	<p>Applicants to Arts, Commerce, Planning, and Science who meet our minimum general entry requirements but are missing a high school prerequisite for a required course in their degree are granted conditional admission. They must complete an elective UNBC course equivalent to the missing prerequisite within their first year to receive Clear Admission.</p>
IB credit information	<p>Students awarded the International Baccalaureate Diploma may be awarded up to 30 credit hours of credit upon receipt of the official transcript. Students who are awarded the diploma must have an overall standing of four, with no course below a three. Diploma students are required to present three Higher level subjects and three Subsidiary level subjects in order to be eligible for transfer credits. Students who are awarded the International Baccalaureate</p>

AP credit information	<p>Students who take the College Board Advanced Placement courses in high school may be awarded transfer credit upon receipt of the official exam results. Courses completed with a grade of four or above will be awarded transfer credit. Students who have completed AP courses with a grade of three may be considered for Advanced Standing. Advanced Standing allows a student to register in a higher level course without the required prerequisite. However, as credit is not awarded advanced standing will not reduce the number of credits that a student must accumulate to obtain a UNBC degree. As a result, a student must make up this credit by completing another course to be used towards their degree requirements. 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Transcript requirements	We accept self-declared grades upon application. Provisional Offers are sent based on grade declaration – rolling basis. Interim grades are required in the spring, and final grades are required in the summer. (For Bachelor of Health Sciences, Bachelor of Applied Science, and Bachelor of Science in Nursing, final grade 11 marks are required by deadline.)

Treatment of second choice program(s)	Students can apply to one program per application. If the student is interested in more than one program, they can file additional applications. For each application we require self-declared grades to be submitted to make provisional offers of admission. One offer issued – applicants must choose which program they prefer at that time.

NEW INSTITUTION UPDATES/HIGHLIGHTS

- UNBC student athletes in cross-country skiing and biathlon will be able to compete at the post-secondary level with the new Nordic ski team, a partnership between UNBC and the Caledonia Nordic Ski Club. Under this partnership, the Caledonia Nordic Ski Club will provide student athletes with a training plan, expert coaching, waxing services (both on and off-site), as the athletes train at the club’s world-class facilities. - Composting machine in the cafeteria: A brand-new composter at UNBC allows for dairy, meat, fish, fruit and vegetable scraps, bread products, wooden and bamboo cutlery, napkins, tea bags and cooked food to go into it. This machine means that eating in the UNBC cafeteria will be a nearly zero waste experience!
- Engineering Co-op: UNBC’s Engineering Co-op is designed to allow students to enter and gain work experience earlier than most other institutions. Students may apply once completing 30 credit hours (as early as their first summer!).

ENGINEERING & NURSING REQUIREMENTS

[Civil Engineering](#), [Environmental Engineering](#), and [Environmental Engineering \(Joint UNBC and UBC\)](#): Overall average of 75% minimum in the following: ELA 30-1, Math 30-1 (min.67%), 2 Approved Academic Grade 12 Science (Physics 30 and Chemistry 30 are strongly recommended due to first-year course content), Additional Grade 12 Course (Elective or Academic).

[Northern Collaborative Baccalaureate Nursing Program](#) (NCBNP): Offered collaboratively between UNBC, the College of New Caledonia (CNC), and Coast Mountain College (CMTN), the NCBNP provides a four-year integrated program culminating in a UNBC Bachelor of

Science in Nursing. Overall average of 70% minimum in the following: ELA 30-1 (min.70%), Biology 30 (min.73% completed within 5 years of acceptance), 2 Approved Academic Grade 12 Courses, Grade 12 Course (Elective or Academic), Chemistry 20 (min.70%), Math 20-1 or Math 20-2 (min.70%).

[Northern Baccalaureate Nursing Program](#) (NBNP): Minimum "B" average in the most recent 60 credit hours of university transferable coursework. Meet the 24 credit hours of [required prerequisite coursework](#). Have a minimum of 24 credit hours of university-level coursework completed at the 200-level or above. Completion of an [online computer-based assessment CASPer test](#) in addition to meeting the above academic requirements.
